SECTION 4: GRAMMAR THROUGH FILM

Grammar Focus: Past Tenses

- Past Simple — completed actions: "I ran." / "She said."
- Past Continuous — background actions: "She was sitting on the porch."
- Past Perfect — earlier past: "I had run for three years."
- Used to — habits in the past: "Mama used to say..."
